OBITUARY.

LENA TUBBS WARNER.

A beautiful life of twenty-five summers came to a sad and untimely end Tuesday, June 30, when Lena Tubbs Warner succumbed to the combined at-

When the news of her sudden death spread throughout the village and surrounding community a wave of depression was left in its wake for such was the beautiful simplicity and sweetness of her character that every one who knew her, whether intimately or merely by acquaintance, seemed to feel a distinct personal loss.

Lena Tubbs was born in Castleton, Barry Co., March 24, 1883. On her eighth birthday she moved, with her parents, to their present home in Vermontville. She graduated in June, 1903, from the local high school. Her teachers characterize her school work as careful, systematic and thorough.

June 9, 1904, she was married to Fred A. Warner and lived one year on his father's farm east of town, later moving near Charlotte. Last fall they returned to Vermontville and have since lived with her parents assisting in the tilling of their fine farm.

During all her life she was a faithful Christian, active in Sunday School, League and Church. She was baptized and received into the local Methodist church March 14, 1896. Wherever she was known she was highly esteemed and appreciated, but the sense of real loss seemed to settle most heavily upon those who had been engaged with her in the Master's work.

To Mr. and Mrs. Warner was born one daughter, Gertrude, a sweet child of two years, who, the husband, her father and mother (Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Tubbs, a brother Orin of Kalamazoo, and a sister Mrs. Nellie of Battle Creek, Mich.)
