Hervey A. Warner.

Hervey A. Warner was born Dec. 2, 1884 in Chester, Mich., died at Roswell, New Mexico, Sunday, Sept. 27. He attended school in this village, graduating therefrom in 1901, and while here was active in church work, joining the Methodist church in Ann Arbor. After some post graduate work here he entered Albion college in 1903, going from there to Ann Arbor and entering the Engineering department in the fall of 1904, continuing this course until stricken with the disease which caused his death. In recognition of his faithful and efficient work he was awarded a diploma, by faculty vote altho being unable to appear with his class on graduation day.

He had already been appointed to a position on the irrigation works now being carried on by the U. S. Govt. in Idaho. This position he was destined never to fill. Seeking health in New Mexico, he received the call that comes some time to us all, and the work he fitted himself for will be carried on by other hands.

He was everywhere known as an earnest christian and his high manly virtues were an inspiration to all who knew him.

The funeral services were held on Friday afternoon. Rev. Merrill and Rev. Parsons officiating. Interment at Woodlawn cemetery.
