

DEATH OF MRS. P. L. GREEN

Prominent Vermontville Lady Passes Away After Lingered Illness

The people of this community were greatly shocked Friday morning, Jan. 29, to learn that Mrs. P. L. Green had passed away at 1.20 A. M. in Lake Butler, Florida.

Dr. and Mrs. Green went south shortly before Christmas to escape the cold winter here and in the hope of benefiting the latter's health as she had not been well for a year or more. This summer while in Petoskey she was ill most of the time and after her return here was in very poor health altho she was so ambitious that few of her friends realized how serious her condition was.

Altho not well for so long her last illness was of short duration, the cause of her death being neuritis followed by heart failure. During her last sickness the doctor was ably assisted by the best of medical skill and a trained nurse but all to no avail.

Dr. Green came home as soon as could be arranged after her death, reaching here Monday morning, and the funeral was held Wednesday morning at 11.30 in the Congregational Church, Rev. Parsons officiating. Interment at Woodlawn.

Mrs. Zilla Green was one of the most prominent ladies in Vermontville, being active in church work, also in

the clubs with which she was connected, being one of the founders of the Monday Musical, and will be very greatly missed by all with whom she was associated.
