

to come in contact with this wonderful mind were charmed with his rare intellect. As a school man he was successful and loved the work. He was superintendent of schools at Deatur, Mich., and Michigan City, Indiana, where he stood high in his profession.

While at Michigan City, during Civil War times, he responded to our country's call and helped to organize a company, serving as Lieutenant. This company was under General Robert Milroy. At the close of the war, he entered the University of Michigan to study medicine. Graduating from Ann Arbor he began the practice of his profession in Vermontville in 1870, where he was a successful physician and surgeon for forty years.

Although the knowledge in his profession is constantly broadening and changing, he always kept up well with the times and took post-graduate courses at Cleveland, Chicago and New York.

Entering most of the homes in the surrounding community in a professional way he was a true and sincere friend. His sympathetic and deeply religious nature made his influence felt everywhere he would go. In his early youth he became a Christian and through his entire life he has been a powerful force in religious work. At the age of fourteen with some of his companions he organized a weekly prayer-meeting in Ohio which accomplished much in those early times and helped to make leaders in religious work for the future.

On July 4, 1875, he was united in marriage to Zuilla S. Moyer. The home life of Dr. and Mrs. Green was ideal. It can be truthfully said that their's was the happiest of homes. When the Angel of Death entered this household on January 29, 1909, and carried away the loving wife, there seemed to be so little left here to hold her companion with us, for he was anxiously awaiting the call to join his loved ones on the better shore.

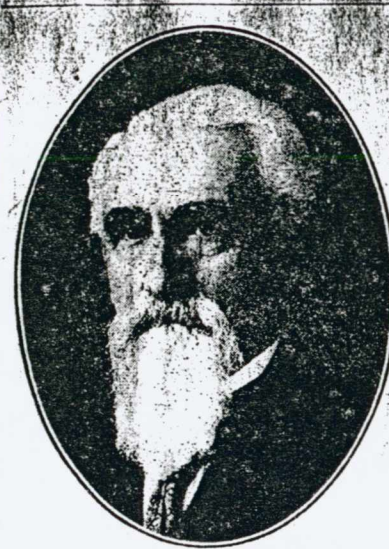
Seven years ago, Karl, aged fifteen, the son and joy of their hearts, was called to that home above to welcome his affectionate parents so soon.
