### MRS. PARTHENIA B. DICKINSON.

In the death of Mrs. Parthenia B. Dickinson, another one of the old residents of Vermontville has passed out of this life. With the exception of a couple of years spent in the south and the past few months with her daughter in Flint and Belding, Mrs. Dickinson has spent practically all of her life in Vermontville.

Born, in Vermontville, on November 7th, 1840, and passing away on Tuesday, December 7th, she had attained the age of seventy years and

one month. She was the daughter of Edward H. and Laura E. Barber. She is survived by her daughter, Mrs. S. C. Arnold, of Belding, and son, Harold B. Dickinson, of Battle Creek. Mr. Dickinson passed away some years ago, while the family resided in the south. An adopted daughter also died while the family resided south.

Mrs. Dickinson was stricken with paralysis about a week previous to her death and did not regain consciousness afterwards. Accompanied by her daughter and family and son, the remains were brought to Vermontville, Thursday evening, and funeral services were held from the home of Mrs. H. G. Barber at two o'clock on Friday, when she was laid at rest in Woodlawn cemetery by the side of her husband. Mrs. Fitzgerald, of Detroit, conducted the Christian Science burial service, she having been the first reader of the church at Flint while Mrs. Dickinson resided there with her daughter, and had become intimately associated with her in the church work.
