The election of Major John Faust as one of the five judges of the recently organized municipal court of Detroit, the other four members being re-elected, is a cause of considerable satisfaction to Eaton county people, especially his old home town folks in Vermontville. Major Faust has been a lawyer in Detroit for 12 years and a resident of that city for 18 years, and for three years has been president of the Lawyers' club of Detroit, and of the alumni association of the Detroit College of Law. He enlisted in the second officers' training camp at Fort Sheridan, Ill., in August, 1917, and was commissioned major, September 10, 1918, while in a hospital in France. He was seriously wounded in the left leg July 21, 1918, near Soissons, in the American counter offensive. The

wound resulted in shortening the leg about an inch and leaving it slightly crooked, causing a slight lameness. Major Faust is 43 years old and a native of Gibsonburg, Ohio from which place a number of Eaton county residents have come.
