## E. E. Loveland

Edward Eugene Loveland was born in Chester, Hamden County Mass., December 28, 1848, and departed this life on July 3, 1927, at the age of 78 years, 6 months and 6 days.

He was a son of David A. and Helen Culver Loveland with whom he removed to Ohio at the age of six years where his boyhood days were spent. He worked with his father at the carpenter trade and at the age of nineteen began work on his own responsibility, thus continuing for four years at the end of which time he removed with his parents to Eaton County, Michigan, but later returned to the east where he became a finished tradesman under the able instruction of an uncle, Edward Culver, contractor and builder at Winsted, Connecticut.

Two years later, in 1873, at the age of twenty-five years, he was married to Miss Rasma Elmore Whelan and after continuing at his trade for four years, purchased a forty acre farm near Charlotte, on the angling road in Chester township, later purchasing one hundred and forty acres on the Vermontville-Chester townline where a fine farm home was hewn out of the forest.

In 1919 this farm was sold, at which time he retired to Vermontville, Michigan, where he resided at the time of his death.

He always took keen interest in public affairs, holding various township offices at different times.

He was the eldest of seven children, Arthur Loveland of Detroit, Michigan, being the only survivor. He leaves to mourn his loss, a wife and two sons, Louis W. and Elmon J., both of Vermontville, and four granddaughters, besides many other relatives and friends.

Funeral services were held at ten o'clock, Wednesday, July 6, from the home in Vermontville, conducted by Rev. H. H. Rogers and burial was made in Maple Hill cemetery in Charlotte.
