## HENRY MILTON NORTON

Henry Milton Norton, the son of Jacob and Mary Ann Norton, was born February 3, 1849, in Ohio, iater moving with his parents near Kendallville, Indiana, and still later near Battle Creek. When he was nineteen years of age it became necessary to amputate his right leg, so he always had to use crutches, though he never allowed that to keep him from participating in any activity. He especially delighted in hunting and fishing, and was unusually skillful.

In 1869 he was united in marriage to Mrs. Antha Austin Wells of Vermontville, and one son was born but only lived ten months. For a number of years they lived on Main Street, Vermontville, in the building he erected, part of their home, and part of it for his photograph gallery and general repair shop.

After the death of his wife in 1904 he lived alone for several years then he married Mrs. Mina Mikesell Hultz of Charlotte, who died about nine years ago, after a long period of helpless invalidism. March 10, 1912 fire destroyed his home and he narrowly escaped with his life.

Aside from a comparatively short stay in Charlotte and in Houghton Lake, Mr. Norton's life has been spent in Vermontville on Main St. In spite of his physical handicap and lonely condition, he has been unusually brave and cheerful and everyone's friend. He passed away May 3, 1929, aged 80 years and 3 months. Surviving him are his sister Mrs. Adell Randall of Vermontville. and five half brothers and sisters Jacob, of Traverse City; Charle of Windy, Alaska; William of Lan ing; Mrs. Amelia Self of Owosso a Mrs. Alice Esget of Lily, South L. kota, and a large number of nephews and nieces.

Funeral services were conducted by Elder Roach Sunday at two p. m. at the Mapes & Ward funeral home in Vermontville and burial took place in Woodlawn
