OLD RESIDENT OF VERMONTVILLE DIES AT HOSPITAL

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Lake Alfred, Nov. 23—Mrs. Flora Squires La Du, a resident of this city for the past six years, who passed away at Morrell Memorial hospital Wednesday evening at 11:45 o'clock, was born in Vermontville, Michigan, March 15, 1857, and graduated from Milwaukee-Downer college in 1881. The following year, with a small party of friends she migrated to the then Territory of Dakota and settled at Lisbon, thus becoming one of the pioneers of the great northwest. November 12, 1884, she was united in marriage to Gilbert La Du of Lisbon, Mr. La Du dying in 1904. Living in Lisbon until the fall of 1922, she then came with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond W. Craig, to Lake Alfred, where she has since resided with them.

Hers was a fine Christian character, a loyal friend and neighbor and a loving, helpful mother. A home lover, she was a homemaker in the truest sense of the word, always happiest in the home circle, with children and grandchildren, by whom she was greatly loved.

Surviving her are three daughters, Mrs. Glenn Townsend, Fort Snelling, Minn.; Mrs. George Riebeth, Buffalo, N. Y., and Mrs. Raymond Craig of Lake Alfred; six grandchildren and one brother, Waite C. Squires of Little Rock, Ark. Mrs. Craig was the only member of the family able to be with her in the closing days of her life. Mr. Craig and Mrs. Townsend arrived Thursday evening and funeral services were held at the mortuary parlors in Winter Haven, Saturday afternoon. The remains will be placed in a vault in Winter Haven cemetery to lie until spring and then taken to Lisbon, N. D., to rest in the family burying lot in Oakwood cemetery.
