It won \$10 in cash also.

Ellen E. Bale Stone was born in Lewiston, Niagara Co., New York, December 16, 1843, and passed to the higher life, December 31, 1930 at her home in Vermontville, Michigan following many months of illness.

Mrs. Stone was the oldest child of the union of William and Margaret Bale. She spent all the early years of her life in Lewiston, where she was united in marriage, June 21, 1870 to Joseph B. Stone, also of Lewiston.

In the year 1876 they came to Michigan and settled in Vermontville, where she spent the remainder of her life.

To this union one child was born, Alma, now Mrs. Allen Faust.

When very young Mrs. Stone became affiliated with the Presbyterian church of Lewiston and was an active member as teacher in the Sunday School.

Mrs. Stone has always lived a quiet Christian life, deeply devoted to her family and home.

She has left to mourn their loss the aged husband, the daughter, one sister, Mrs. Esther Fleming of Niagara Falls, N. Y., four grandchildren, Mrs. E. A. Clarke of Chicago, Mrs. R. V. Hess of Kal-amazoo, Grace and Alton Faust, besides several nieces and nephews and many other relatives in New York and Washington, D. C.

The funeral services were held from the family home on West Main street, Saturday, January 3, 1931, at ten-thirty o'clock, with interment at Woodlawn cemetery, Vermontville, Michigan.
