Clara Sophia Dean, the fifth child of Charles W. and Nancy Ann Dean, was born in Chester township on August 19, 1879 and departed from this life at her birthplace, on Sunday July 3, 1932, at the age of 52 years, 10 months and 14 days.

She gave her heart and life to Christ when she was fourteen years of age and joined the Methodist Episcopal church at Vermontville. The remainder of her life was spent trying to follow in the footsteps of Christ and to lead others to Him. She was active in church work, teaching a Sunday School class as long as she was able.
