Mary Cross was born in Leslie, Ingham County, Michigan, December 20, 1858, and departed this life at her home in Vermontville July the 13th, 1932, at the age of seventy-three.

She was the oldest of a family of four children. A sister, Mrs. Scelinda DePlanta of Grand Rapids survives.

In 1875 she was united in marriage to Henry L. Williams and later adopted a son Roscoe who now lives on the farm one-half mile west of town.

She was a woman of exceptional honor and strong conviction which displayed to the very end.

Mrs. Williams has long been a faithful church worker and was always seen in the place of worship in the Methodist church here until failing health prevented her further attendance. She leaves besides her son Roscoe, his wife and daughters Dorothy and Louise. She will also be missed by a large circle of friends and relatives.

Funeral services were held at the home Friday, July 15th, at 2:00 p. m., conducted by Rev. C. H. Phillips of Wayland. Interment was at Eaton Rapids cemetery, beside her husband who passed away about ten years ago.
