With great presence of mind, Pvt. Pugh, who was on the shore, rushed to the rescue of his comrade, dove to the bottom and brought him to a nearby boat.

May 29, 1869, she was united in marriage to George D. Granger. To this union five children were born, one daughter and four sons: Eda M., Erbie C., Emery G., Emerson D. and Earl W., Emery dying in infancy, one son, Emerson passed away in 1912, the daughter Eda in 1923.

Mr. and Mrs. Granger lived on their farm in Vermontville township 55 years. From there they moved to their present home in Chester.

Mrs. Granger was a member of the Chester L. A. S. and became a member of the Chester Congregational church in 1894. She was an active worker in the church until ill health deprived her of the work she enjoyed.
