We are glad to announce that a change in mail train time has made it possible to re-establish an earlier morning schedule for Rural Carriers so that all Daily papers will arrive on time for the farmers noon day interval.

Beginning August 17th Rural Carriers will leave the Post Office at 9:30 a. m. fast time and will arrive at the Post Office on time for the letter mail dispatch at 12:05 p. m. Parcel Post dispatch at 5:30 p. m.

A larger quantity of mail matter will arrive at the Post Office after the Carriers leave in the morning than was the case under the old schedule.
