Nellie passed away in 1901. Besides the widow, he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Eva Clark of Charlotte; three grand-children, Lloyd Weyant, Lansing, Cecil Weyant and Mrs. Marie Grant Vermontville; and a foster daughter, Mrs. Hazel McIntire, Battle Creek; two great-granddaughters and one great-grandson.
