Joseph B. Stone, last Civil War Veteran, and highly respected resident of Vermontville for fiftyeight years, died April 21, 1934, at his home on West Main Street, following a week's illness.

Joseph Bronson Stone was born at Lewiston, Niagara County, New York, April 2, 1844, and at the time of his death, was ninety years, and nineteen days old.

Mr. Stone's parents, Chauncey and Mary Stone had a large family, of which Joseph was next to the youngest. His early life was spent at the farm home near Lewiston, where with his brothers and sisters he attended the country school and helped with the farm duties until he was eighteen years
