sold after he popularized the song in "The Singing Fool." Other tunes that made his career were "Swance", "April Showers" and "California, Here I Come."

His career became temporarily eclipsed in the 1930's.

He came back, as big as ever, after World war II with the release of the movie, "The Jolson Story." It starred Larry Parks, with Jolson's voice dubbed in for the songs that made him famous. Then came "Jolson Sings Again."

He went on the radio, on his own show and those of his friends. One of them, Bing Crosby, was scheduled to arrive Tuesday to record a show with him.

Jolson married four times. Besides his widow, the former Erle Galbraith, he leaves an adopted son, Asa, jr., 2.

Previous wives were Henrietta Keller, who divorced him in 1919; Alma Osborne, who divorced him in 1926, and Ruby Keeler, who divorced him in 1939. She was given custody of another adopted son, Al, jr.
