Noted Lawyer, Dudley Field Malone, Dies

CULVER CITY, Calif.—(AP)—Dudley Field Malone, 68, internationally famed attorney, actor and one-time prominent Democrat, is dead.

Malone gained national recognition as an associate of the late Clarence Darrow in the famed Scopes evolution trial in 1925.

He succumbed in his sleep at Culver City Hospital after suffering a hemorrhage Wednesday.

Malone served as collector of the Port of New York during World War II. He was an assistant Secretary of State for seven months in 1913 during Woodrow Wilson's first term as President.

Among the causes he espoused were women's suffrage, repeal of prohibition and freedom for India.

In the 1920's he achieved an international reputation with his handling of divorce cases in Paris, then the forerunner of Reno. His clients included Ganna Walska, Julius Fleischmann and W. K. Vanderbilt.

Malone was married and divorced three times. His son, Dudley Field (Shim) Malone, Jr., of London, survives.

In 1932 and 1936 he broke with the Democrats and Franklin Roosevelt—earlier his friend—by supporting Hoover and Alf M. Landon, the Republican nominees for President.

Roxand Veteran Passes At 94

Wm. Root was born in Cuyahoga Co. Ohio, August 18, 1833 and departed this life at Mulliken January 11, 1928, aged 94 years, 4 months and 2 days. He is survived by 8 children, 30 grandchildren and 14 great

grandchildren. A son, Leonard, passed away at the age of 21 years.

He enlisted in the Civil War in the spring of 1862 in the 23 Ohio, infantry and served under Col. R. B. Hayes and Major Wm. McKinley. During his service his first wife and 17 months old son died. He was mustered out in July 1865. He returned to Ohio and later married Miss Ann Elizabeth Ingram the mother of his children.

March 12, 1873 they moved to Eaton Co. Michigan and settled on the farm which they occupied until Mrs. Root's death, May 20, 1904. Mr. Root continued to live there until July 5, 1907, when he married Mrs. M. A. Campbell and moved to Mulliken.

His children are George, Fred and Alfred of Roxand, Mrs. Lille O'Brien, Stockbridge, Mrs. Ida Cole and Mrs. Ruby Green, Lansing, Mrs. Elvira Jackson of Saginaw Road near Lansing and Mrs. Alma Maskel of Grand Ledge.

After the death of his last wife he lived with his niece, Miss Lulu Campbell, who was a daughter to him and tenderly cared for him in his last illness.

The many beautiful floral offerings attested to the high esteem in which he was held. Flags were flown at half mast in Mulliken Saturday, the day of his funeral. He was laid to rest beside his second wife in the Mulliken cemetery, Rev. Gray officiating.
