"Jimmy," as he was affectionately called by attendants at the county convalescent hospital, died as he believed he was recovering from the dread disease.

He was optimistic about his chances of leaving the hospital as late as 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, when his picture was taken by a commercial photographer at the hospital.

The picture was taken during presentation of a motion picture project to the Ingham county polio chapter, to be used to entertain youngsters like "Jimmy." He looked forward to seeing cartoons and other

pictures.

For nine months, "Jimmy's" pain wracked body had wasted away, but he had gained a pound between Tuesday and Wednesday's weighing ceremonies at the hospital. This caused him to beam and his parents to become hopeful after months of

despair.

Then early Thursday morning there came a crisis and little "Jimmy" failed to have enough "heart" left to fend off the ravages of polio.

Besides the parents, he is survived by a brother, Thomas LeRoy; two sisters, Janet Ardis and Beverly Ann, and the grandparents Mrs. Ann, and the grandparents, Mrs. Hazel Tower of Byron and Mr. and Mrs. Omer Williams of Lansing.
