MYRON BOSWORTH DIES AT AGE 89

Myron H. Bosworth, 89 passed away Sunday at his farm home 6 1/2 miles north east of Vermontville in the same house where he was born. He was first a school teacher, farmer, merchant, supervisor, on the board of directors of the Barry and Eaton Fire Insurance Co. He came near being burned to death by a gasoline explosion about 20 years ago, hit by a car, had a tractor tip over on him but died in his chair. President Garfield's Son

CLEVELAND—(AP)—James R. Garfield, 84, son of President James A. Garfield and himself a former Cabinet officer under President Theodore Roosevelt, died Friday.

He was Roosevelt's secretary of interior from 1907 to 1909, Progressive Party candidate for Ohio Governor in 1912 and candidate for Senator in 1914.

He practiced law here all his life.

Garfield, Roosevelt and Gifford Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, were a trio noted for their efforts at conservation of the nation's natural resources.

He also was a close friend of Herbert Hoover.

Garfield married Helen Newell, of Chicago, in 1890. They had four children. Mrs. Garfield died in an automobile accident in 1930.
