GEORGE M. SLOCUM



WITH the recent passing of George M. Slocum, Father Time wrote the final chapter to a fine family tradition of service to agriculture - especially Michigan agriculture.

For many years the name has been identified with rural Michigan. George was born 60 years ago, in the village of Caro in Tus-

cola-County. He was the only son of the late Grant H. Slocum, founder of the Ancient Order of Gleaners. His father also founded the farm paper known as The Gleaner, as well as a little marketing paper called "The Pink Sheet." George worked in the print shop for some time and in 1915 became publisher. Soon after that the 2 publications were consolidated under the name of Michigan Business Farming. Later it was changed to Michigan Business Farmer. In 1928 it was consolidated with the MICHIGAN FARMER, and George became vicepresident of Capper-Harman-Slocum, Inc., publishers of Michigan Farmer, Ohio Farmer and Pennsylvania Farmer.

In 1925 he originated the Automotive News, a trade publication for the automobile and truck industry, which was a great success. While this publication placed increasing demands upon his time and talents these recent years, he never lost his sincere concern over the welfare of farm folks. His wife, Mabel, survives.

Your editor was privileged to work for and with George M. Slocum for several years. He was a friendly man with a warm personality. His smile was sincere and ready. His handclasp strong. He inspired people to greater efforts through confidence and encouragement. Many of his ideas and programs brought about a fuller life in the country.

He was truly a great friend of farm folks. He was a great friend of mankind. He was a real American.
