It was a terrible thing and a shock to all the family.

The funeral was held Wednesday at 2:00 p. m. at the Farley Funeral Home, in Battle Creek, with burial here at Woodlawn, in the Loveland lot, with a prayer service at the grave.

He established his own plumbing business in 1942. The survivors include the widow, Ethel; one son, Kennet of Nashville; two step-daughters, Mrs. Montiel Dull of Morgan and Mrs. Lelia Johnson of Battle Creek; the mother, Mrs. Grace Hoffman, Nashville; one brother, Eber, Nashville; one sister, Mrs. Erma Aspinall, Hickory Corners and five step-grandchildren. The body was brought to the Hess funeral chapel, and services will be arranged from there.

Roy S. Doty Died Thursday

Leading Citizen of Grand Ledge Had Been Alderman, Mayor and Member Board of Education

Roy S. Doty, Grand Ledge leader for many years, died Thursday night. Services were held at the Congregational church Sunday afternoon, Mr. Doty having been a member of this denomination for many years and having held official positions in the society. His pastor, Rev. Harold Watson officiated. Mr. Doty in past years had served as alderman, mayor, and for nine years was a member of the school board. He was the son of the late Sanford and Ella Doty and was born on a farm in nearby Eagle township, coming to Grand Ledge in 1901, entered the produce company with his uncle, the late E. Ellis Doty. On Sept. 2, 1903, he married Miss Theresa Kiser of that city and they had one son, Stuart W. Doty, probably the best known, county-wide, citizen in the Ledge. The pallbearers were the seven directors of the Grand Ledge Produce company, of which he had been manager and secretary-treasurer since 1920 and were: King Lee, John B. Strange, John P. Espie, Elmer Vogt, Albert Kelsey, Bert Crosby and Clifford Benjamin. Besides the widow and son, Mr. Doty is survived by one brother, Harrison P. Doty of Eagle township, and one sister, Miss Mabel Doty, librarian at LeGrande, Ore., who was here on vacation when he died. Interment at Oakwood cemetery.

Miss Schneider, who lost her life in the same crash, had been employed as a clerical worker at the Motor Wheel corporation here for the past five years. She was a graduate of Eastern high school and a life resident of this city.

She is survived by the parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Schneider of Lansing; one brother, William L. Schneider, and a half-brother, George R. Jerkins of Lansing; three sisters, Mrs. Arlen Delp and Mrs. Ida Ruth Wood, both of Lansing, and Mrs. Doris Robinson of Saginaw.
