Death Takes Two Wheelers

Death recently took two veteran Motor Wheel employees. They were Howard A. Kenway, who had been on leave of absence from the Automotive Division and Harold E. Sedore, a Motor Wheel employee since 1936.

Mr. Kenway died October 29 after an extended illness. He came to Motor Wheel in 1925 as a buffer in the hub shop. In 1932 he was transferred to the centrifuse brake drum department and had been employed in that department as a set-up man until about five years ago when he went on leave of absence. He was 51 years old when he died.

Funeral services were held from the Gorsline-Runciman funeral home and interment was in Chapel Hill cemetery.
