## Soldier Admits Hitting Leo W. Hoke, 29

Owen Carvill, 21-year-old army sergeant stationed at Fort Riley, Kan., admitted to local police of icers while being returned here Friday on a manslaughter warant he engaged in a scuffle Nov. 3 with Leo W. Hoke, 29, of 4461 Clyde Park av., SW, in Home Acres in which Hoke suffered brain injuries which proved fatal

Detective John VanderBand of Wyoming township and County Deputy Richard Wiersma said Carvill readily admitted striking Usiv with his fist but denied that anyone else held Hoke at the time, as Hoke had reported after he was hospitalized Nov. 7.

### Gets Into Argument.

Carvill, arrested at his Manhattan, Kan., home by Kansas officers, waived extradition and was returned here by plane late Friday night. He was questioned by Deputy Prosecutor Henry J. Milanowski.

Milanowski said Carvill told him he and his wife, a former local girl, had been drinking in a Home Acres bar on Division av., S, the evening of Nov. 6 and got into an argument when they stepped outside. Hoke, said Carvill and two witnesses, also had been drinking at the bar and came outside, Milanowski stated.

Overhearing the quarrel, Hoke advised Carvill's wife to leave the soldier alone, Milanowski quoted Carvill. The sergeant admitted. Milanowski said, he became in-censed at Hoke's interference and struck Hoke.

Hoke died at Blodgett Memorial hospital Wednesday afternoon of a brain hemorrhage suffered from a blow or fall, reported Dr. G. A. Mulder, medical examiner, who conducted a postmortem examination.
