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Frank Gunnison Clark, one of the nation's automobile pioncers and a native of Lansing, died Thursday of a heart attack at Bloomfield Hills, He was 85 years old.

Members of the family said his death was unexpected. Mr. Clark was born here on Dec

31, 1866, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Gunnison Clark, and at-tended Lansing public schools. He was one of the oldest living gradu-ates of Michigan Agricultural col-lege (now M. S. C.) and was a member of the Patriarch club.

After his graduation from the East Lansing institution he went to work with his father in the Clark Carriage Works, located on the corner of S. Grand ave, and River st.

Aided R. E. Olds It was Mr. Clark who supplied the body for the first "horseless carriage" made by the late Ransom E. Olds, a car which now is on display at the Smithsonian Institute.

His father, however, warned him against entering into the infant automobile business, and he dropped his association with Mr. Olds.

On the death of his father in 1901, Mr. Clark turned back to the I new industry, however, and found-ed the Clark Power Wagon company here, reputed to be the first commercial motor truck industry in the nation.

In the nation. In 1913 he moved to Pontiac 1 and founded the Columbia Motor Truck and Trailer company, an organization which he headed un-til his retirement in 1929.

Lived in Mason

Since his retirement, Mr. Clark has made his residence in Mason. He never lost direct contact with the industry, however, and until the time of his death maintained

a small workshop at his home. Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Kathleen Clark Axley of Green-wich, Conn.; two sons, John T. Clark of Lansing and Albert A. Clark of Bloomfield Hills; two grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren. grandchildren.

His wife, Harriett Anderson Clark, died two years ago. Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 p. m. at the Jewett funeral home in Mason. Burial will be in the family plot at Mt. Hope cemetery.
