He was pastor for years of two churches 1,300 miles apart — the First Baptist church at Fort Worth rtm me and the Temple Baptist church in Detroit, Mich.

He resigned as pastor of the De-troit church in May, 1951, after 16 years there.

At the time of his death, Rev. Norris was chairman of the trustees of the Bible Baptist seminary, which he helped found in Fort Which he helped found in Fort Worth in 1939; pastor of the First, Baptist church in Fort Worth, where he had served 44 years, and director of the World Baptist Fel-

lowship. His church in Fort Worth covered almost a city block downtown. On Sundays his sermons echoed through downtown streets from scloudspeakers outside the huge,
