Rites for Perry A. Daniels, 63, Department No. 35, Plant No. 2, were held April 5 at the Estes - Leadley Colonial Chapel with the Rev. W. M. McGuire and the Rev. Herbert Thomas of the North Street Church of the Nazarene, officiating. Burial was in Chapel Hill Memorial Gardens.

Mr. Daniels died at the home, 1538 Ohio Avenue, April 2 following an illness of several months. He had resided in Lansing since 1919, coming here from Montcalm County. He was a member of the North Street Church of the Nazarene.

Mr. Daniels started working at Motor Wheel April 22, 1936, in Department No. 31, Plant No. 2. He was transferred to Department No. 24 in August of 1936, and to Department No. 35 in September of 1939. He remained in Department No. 35 throughout the balance of his career here, with the exception of a period during World War II when he was employed on one of the brass cartridge case lines.

The survivors include the wife, Blanche M.; two daughters, Mrs. Kenneth O. Mayes and Mrs. Orville V. Lietzke, both of Lansing; a brother, Lawrence and a sister, Mrs. Mabel Garner, both of Gratiot County; and five grandchildren.

## J. M. Bower Dies at 101

### Oldest Lake Odessa Resident Succumbs

Lake Odessa—John M. Bower, Lake Odessa's oldest resident, died Saturday night at 101. He would have reached 102 on June 16. Mr. Bower had been in good health through the winter but caught a cold a few days ago and was admitted to Pennock hospital in Hastings Saturday afternoon. He died a few hours later of pneumonia. The centenarian had kept active. He whittled miniature furniture and was interested in reading and lowers.

#### Gave Recipe.

When he reached 100 he advised anyone wishing to do the same to stay away from tobacco and alcohol, to go to bed and get up early and work hard. Born June 16, 1850 in Thomasville, Ont., Mr. Bower came to Michigan with his parents at the age of 4.

A retired farmer, he had lived in Woodland township of Barry county and Odessa township of Ionia county before moving into Lake Odessa 35 years ago.

He was a member of Evangelical United Brethren church in Lake Odessa and has served as trustee many years in addition to holding other posts.
