George M. Fuller, 84, Dead After Brief Illness

CHARLOTTE, Feb. 9 — George M. Fuller, 84, of 321 E. Lovett st., former Eaton county sheriff and local supervisor, died Friday night at the Myer convalescent home where he had been a patient since last Oct. 22.

Mr. Fuller served as sheriff of Eaton county from 1918 to 1922.

He was born Oct. 24, 1864, in Madison, Wis., the son of William and Martha (Longwell) Fuller, and came, as an infant, with them to Charlotte in its pioneering days. He was married to Clara Stall on Feb. 11, 1891. They observed their 60th wedding anniversary last year.

Mr. Fuller was active in the Methodist church and in civic affairs.

In addition to the widow, he is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Howard Bryan of Charlotte, and a brother, Leon, of Lansing.
