**Coxey Dies;
Led March
For Jobless**

MASSILLON, O., May 19 (AP)—"General" Jacob S. Coxe died last night, 57 years after his ragged army of unemployed marched into Washington and into the nation's history.

He was 97, and he spent more than two-thirds of that long life fighting for a losing cause—printing press money the government could use without paying interest to banks.

"Coxey's Army" left here in 1894 on a 35-day march to Washington to get congress to use the easy-money method for a giant road-building program to ease the hardship brought on by the panic of 1893. The march failed.

But Coxe's belief in the ideas inspiring that march never wavered. Only five weeks ago on his birthday he voiced once more his enthusiasm for money reform as the answer to the country's economic troubles.

Only three of his eight children survive him. Funeral services will be held here Monday.

**Former Sunfield
Publisher Dies**

Separate funeral services for the Flint brothers, Frank H. and Lewis R., who died 13 hours apart, were held Monday and Tuesday.

Lewis, 86, a resident of Galesburg, died there in his sleep about 8 a. m. Friday. His brother, 83, a deaf-mute who overcame his handicap to become a successful printer and newspaper publisher and to work 26 years for Duplex division, died in a Battle Creek convalescent home Saturday.

Frank was the publisher of several newspapers in this area, including the Hickory Corners Leader, the Sunfield News (now the Sentinel), the Augusta Chronicle, and the Barry County Democrat in Hastings.

**Brothers Die Only
Few Hours Apart**

Frank H. Flint, a printer in Sunfield in 1893, and Lewis Flint, brothers of Mrs. Roy Richard, died Friday, April 20. The brothers succumbed within a few hours of each other.

Frank Flint, 88, died in Battle Creek where he had been a resident for several years. Services were conducted in Battle Creek on Tuesday and interment was in the Battle Creek cemetery.

Lewis Flint, 86, lived in Sunfield for 17 years. He died in Galesburg where services were held on Monday. He was buried at Hickory Corners.
