Emma Seitz, oldest daughter of George and Christena Seitz and one of a family of nine children, was born in Ohio April 26, 1871, and moved with her parents to Sunfield township, Eaton County, Michigan, when ten years of age. She attended the Hager and Patterson schools.

She was united in marriage to William Hickey of Vermontville on October 3, 1900 and since that time this has been her home. Their married life was very congenial for and happy and when Mr. Hickey passed away Sept. 16, 1930, she felt keenly her loss.

About two years ago Mrs. Hickey went to Ypsilanti where she found employment in a pleasant home, until ill health made retirement from active duties necessary and she spent some time with her sister Mrs. John Kenworthy. She went to Mercy Hall Hospital, Detroit in December where she was tenderly cared for until the earthly life ended at 1:25 Monday afternoon, January 29, 1934. James Andrews was born in Calhoun County, Michigan, October 26, 1846, and departed this life May 18, 1933, aged 86 years and 8 months.
