The commission shall have the power to make and enforce, not inconsistent with the law governing the several institutions, respecting the conduct of each such institution or facility, property, and for the welfare of the inmates or wards thereof. In all respects, the legal successor to the powers, duties and responsibilities of the commission shall be abolished.

The state department of social welfare shall be appointed by the state at its pleasure. He shall have been a resident of the state for five years and shall be the executive officer of the department,
