EARL H. MOREHOUSE

Earl H. Morehouse was born on his father's farm in Vermontville town-ship, May 4th, 1883, and departed this life at Lawrence, Van Buren County, Michigan, July 30th, 1921, aged 37 years, 2 months and 26 days. He received his education in the district school near his home, and later graduated from the Vermontville High School, after which he taught in the Public Schools of Eaton County for four years. He was for several years engaged in the insurance and real estate business, during which time and he resided in the villages of Mulliken and Lake Odessa.

During the past few years he has been engaged as a traveling salesman, an occupation for which he seemed well fitted, by his genial nature, as well as by his business ability. He was in the employ of two of the larger Milling Companies of the southwest, and through his extensive travels throughout several states he formed a wide acquaintance which, through his whole-souled genial manner resulted in many strong and lasting friendships.

His health having failed him, he was advised by his company a few weeks ago, to take a vacation and seek medical aid in the hope that he might speedily regain his usual health. While he was able to be around all the time, and was apparently feeling much better, his sudden death, Saturday morning as the result of apoplexy came as a great shock to the friends and entire community.

For the past few years he has been a member of the Masonic order, holding his membership with the Lake Odessa Lodge No. 395.

He leaves to mourn their loss, Mother, and many more remote relatives, and a host of friends. Funeral services were held at the M. E. Church on Tuesday, August 2nd, at two p. m., conducted by Rev. F. L. Niles.
