Lawrence Edgar Christman was born August 28, 1903 in Mathews, Indiana to Charles and Grace (Schwennessen) Christman

He was married to Esther Miller on May 17, 1932 in Grand Rapids, Michigan. They moved to Hastings in 1935.

In May 1949, with the help of several other families, he started the Vermontville Gospel Center in the Opera House. He became its pastor in 1950 and served the church for eight years during which time the new Vermontville Bible Church was built on N. Main St.

He was ordained in 1953 and was a member of the Independent Fundamental Churches of America.

He suffered a fatal heart attack and went to the Lord on January 26, 1966.

He is survived by his wife Esther, and two daughters, Mrs Cleo (Lillian) Brown of Vermontville and Mrs Joseph (Beatrice) Burger of Savannah, Georgia; two brothers, Lewis and Ted and a sister, Mrs George Boerema, all of Grand Rapids area.
