Carroll F. Wright, 34, of Benton township, who suffered critical head injuries when his motorcycle and a car collided on the Vermontville Highway Saturday night, died at 6 a.m. Tuesday, in a Lansing hospital from his injuries.

His death was the sixth in Eaton County because of traffic.

Mr. Wright was born Aug. 16, 1932, in the Charlotte area, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don E. Wright, and had been a lifelong resident of the county.

He had been employed as a motor repairman at the Oldsmobile Plant in Lansing.

A veteran of WW I, served his internship, surgical residency and urologic residency at the University Hospital from 1924 to 1929, with 1 year in Grand Rapids in industrial surgery. He entered private practice in

Lansing in the summer of 1929, retiring in 1958.
