WELTHY A. CHERRY.

Mrs. Welthy A. Cherry was born at Union, Michigan, November 27, 1840, where she resided until the death of her mother Marie Arnold in 1843. She then went to Ohio and lived with her grandmother until 1847 when her father remarried and she returned to Union.

In May 1860 she was united in marriage to C. H. Cherry. They moved to Vermontville in 1878, where they have since resided. She was mother of three children, E. H. Cherry of Owosso, Mrs. E. L. Jones, of this town, and Dolly L. Cherry who preceded her mother to the Haven of Rest April 23, 1896.

We make the following extract on the death of Daniel Diehl from the Fulton (Ohio) Signal of Feb. 25, 1897.

"Daniel Diehl the fourth son of Jacob and Mary Ann Diehl, a respected citizen and pioneer resident of this county for about 58 years, and one of the best known farmers of the county, died at his home in Manchester, Saturday, Feb. 13, 1897, aged 78 years and 8 days. He was born in York county, Pa., Feb. 5, 1819, and removed to Ohio with his mother, two sisters and three brothers in 1827. He was a blacksmith by trade and amassed a good fortune by industry and frugality. He was married three times and leaves a large circle of relatives and friends to mourn his loss.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. C. E. Keller, of Akron, assisted by Rev. R. H. Gwinner of Ashland, and the remains were interred in the Manchester cemetery. Those who were present from a distance were, Jeremiah Diehl, of Eaton Co., Mich., Mrs. W. E. Grove and daughter Theodora, of Newton, Kansas and D. D. Diehl of Butler, Indiana."

For the last two months of his life Jeremiah Diehl of Vermontville, remained by his bedside and assisted in making his last days as comfortable as possible.
