He withdrew because of lack of funds and started a business career. He went to Portland to investigate a lumber mill operation in 1905 with a round trip ticket but fell in love with Oregon and decided to remain. He has been owner of Griswold Lumber Co., lumber brokers for many years and along with business interests established deep roots of civic interest and activity.

In February, 1963 the National Conference of Christians and Jews presented Mr. Griswold with a Certificate of Recognition for outstanding leadership in promoting the cause of good will and understanding among the people of our nation, thereby fostering amity, justice and cooperation among Protestants, Catholics and Jews, helping to eliminate intergroup prejudices which disfigure and distort religious, business, social and political relations, materially aiding the work of the National Conference of Christians and Jews and bringing us nearer the goal of the Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God.

His creed was that the only things of life that we can keep are the things we give away.

He is survived by a brother, Robert, three sisters, Della Griswold, Mrs Charles Paulden, and Catherine Griswold all of Portland, Oregon.
