VERMONTVILLE — Funeral services were held here Saturday for George W. Humphrey, 70, who died Wednesday. Born in England, he moved to Detroit where he was married to Florence Wells in 1922. Mr. Humphrey worked for Michigan Bell Telephone Co. in Detroit before he retired and moved to Vermontville a few years ago. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Triam & AM in Detroit. He is survived by the widow, three sisters and two brothers who live in land.

Funeral Services Held Saturday For George Humphrey

George W. Humphrey, born in Eastbourne, England, February 5, 1893, passed away suddenly at his home in Vermontville on October 16, after three years of ill health. He came to Quebec, Canada in 1907, and a few years later to Detroit where he became a naturalized citizen. He served overseas with the American forces in World War I. For thirty-five years he worked for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company in various capacities, retiring March 1, 1958.
