hallucinations and a persecution complex.

She told officers she killed her husband because she feared h would send her back to a ment! nospital.

During their attempts to ques-tion her Wednesday afternoon, Mrs. Landis blamed noted Hollywood screen stars as instigators of a plot to kill her husband, and then launched a tirade against the state of California.

Detectives said that during their interview with the woman Wednesday afternoon she told how she hid in a bedroom with the loaded shotgun and fired two shots at her husband a few minutes after he walked into their home.

She explained that her husband had hidden the shotgun and a deer rifle under the sofa in the living room but she had a discovered their hiding place.

When her husband came home at 10:40 p. m. Tuesday, she said, he removed his coat and looked under the sofa where the guns had been hidden.

Finding one gone, he started toward their bedroom. About the same time, Mrs. Landis said she walked out the door and fired one blast at him. She told police she fired a second time "because he didn't die."

DEAD ON FLOOR

Detectives Montgomery and Murphy learned that Landis punched out at the Motor Wheel factory at 10:30 p. m. Thirteen minutes later, police received a report of the shooting and found him dead on the living room floor.

Interviews with the couple's four children revealed that after the first blast from the shotgun they heard their father cry out, "Don't do it, don't do it," then they heard the second shot.

Marilyn Landis, 12, 7told detectives she was the first to come out of the children's bedroom saw her mother standing in the door of the hallway to the living room holding the shotgun.

She said she pushed her mother aside and looked to find her father lying face down in blood on the floor.

The other three children and a fourth neighbor child who was staying overnight with them, also said they came out into the living room and saw Mrs. Landis with the gun and saw her leave the house.

Marilyn and her older sister, Yvonne, 13, turned their father over on his back and put a pillow under his head, they told

police. Police arrived minutes later after Mrs. Landis had gone to a neighbor's home across the street and told them she had killed her husband.
