# Roy Dean Dies at 70

## Longtime Lansing Auto Dealer Is Victim Of Heart Attack

Roy E. Dean, 70, one of Lansing's oldest automobile dealers, died unexpectedly of a heart attack about 10:15 o'clock Monday morning at St. Lawrence hospital. He lived at 3016 Cambridge rd.

Stricken in the Dean & Harris Ford agency, 416 E. Grand River ave., Mr. Dean was rushed to the west side hospital but died soon after being admitted to the emergency room.

Mr. Dean, president of Dean & Harris of Lansing, had been suffering some time from a heart ailment, according to members of the family.

### DEALER 45 YEARS

He had been a Ford dealer for 45 years, during which time he was associated with D. D. Harris in an automobile dealership that had its beginning in Webberville. The dealership was moved here 37 years ago.

Since Jan. 1, 1915, Mr. Dean had helped to build the dealership into more than a \$4,000,000-a-year corporation. He also was vice president of Dean & Harris, Inc.

Born near Webberville on Dec. 11, 1889, Mr. Dean was graduated from Webberville high school, attended normal school and engaged in school teaching prior to joining Mr. Harris in the automotive business.

### BANK DIRECTOR

Affiliations included Plymouth Congregational church, North Side Commercial club, Chamber of Commerce of Greater Lansing, Lansing Automobile Dealers association, and Michigan Automobile Dealers association. He also was a director of the Bank of Lansing.

Survivors are his widow, Esther A.; a son, Harris D. Dean; two daughters, Mrs. Maurice B. Goddard of Lansing and Mrs. Rollin G. Lemm of Grand Rapids; a sister, Mrs. Alta McWethey of Lansing and eight grandchildren.

The body was taken to Gorsline-Runciman funeral home, pending funeral arrangements.
