This section shall not apply to taxes levied for the purpose of financing the construction of a motor vehicle upon which a license has been issued in this state, shall, in addition to the license fee, be used exclusively for the purpose of defraying the cost of the license; provided, the Legislature shall have the power to transfer motor vehicles and their certificates of title to the general sales tax, the use tax, the fees and taxes levied on operators' and chauffeurs' license laws which are levied by corporations organized for profit; nor to ad valorem taxes on gasoline and like fuels held in stock or bond, or on motor vehicles in stock or bond.
