Man Killed In Sawmill

Willis Leach, Charlotte, Struck in Neck by Flying Blade

CHARLOTTE, Nov. 3—Willis

Leach, 55, was killed in a sawmill accident three miles south of here late Thursday morning.

He was sawing a log with a circular saw with the aid of Howard Hice of R-4, Charlotte, when the blade broke and a flying piece of metal struck him in the neck. Leach was killed instantly.

Acting Coroner Richard Twitchell of Pottsville is investigating the accident.

Leach was the owner and operator of the sawmill which has been in the Leach family for about 40 years. Hice was employed by Leach.

The mill is on S. Cochran rd. in Brookfield township.

The body was brought to the Burkhead-Cheney funeral home in Charlotte.

Survivors include the widow, Irene; two daughters, Mrs. Edward Worgul, Lansing, and Mrs. George Kroeze, Fremont, and five grandchildren.
