

# Prominent Writer Dies

## Reader's Digest Senior Editor, Stanley High, Heart Victim

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (AP) — Stanley H. High, 65, a senior editor of Reader's Digest magazine, died Friday in Doctors' hospital.



He had been ill since last year with heart and respiratory ailments.

High was a speech writer for President Franklin D. Roosevelt in the early days of the new deal.

He later broke with the New Deal and was a member of the presidential campaign staffs of Thomas E. Dewey in 1944 and 1948 and of Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1952.

He once said he felt President Roosevelt's goals in the early part of his administration were for the good of the American people.

But, he added, "I felt the same objectives were better represented by Thomas E. Dewey and Gen. Eisenhower; so I worked with them."

High, who lived in Noroton, Conn., was an author whose books included a best-selling biography of Evangelist Billy Graham. Others included "Roosevelt — And Then," "The Church And Politics," "The Revolt of Youth," and "China's Place In the Sun."

He was a correspondent in Russia for the Christian Science Monitor in 1924 and later became editor of the Christian Herald.

He became a roving editor for Reader's Digest in 1940 and had been a senior editor since 1952.

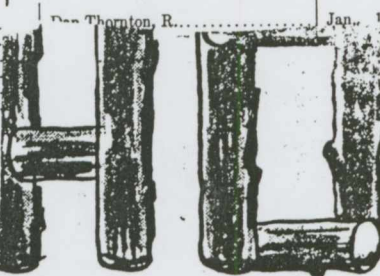
