

Ex-City Clerk Is Praised As 'Faithful Servant' To Church, Public

Miss Bertha Ray was eulogized as "a faithful servant who did not compromise between her church and public life."

Miss Ray, 79, served as city clerk for Lansing for 27 years before retiring in 1950.

Rev. Julius Fischbach, pastor of the First Baptist church, recalled at the services held in Gorsline-Runciman funeral home, that Miss Ray served for several years as clerk of the church while she worked for the city.

"Miss Ray was much more than a good accountant who paid great attention to detail," the pastor said. "She was a faithful servant of her community and her church."

Miss Ray was the first woman in Michigan to hold the post of city clerk. She is also believed to be the first woman to cast a

ballot in Lansing.
