

U. B. Benedict was the pastor in 1877, by 1844 the Academy had scholars from various parts of Eaton county and from Battle Creek. By 1837 the village stretched out a mile long from east to west with two rows of log houses fronting the street ten to forty rods apart - one frame house built by W.J. Scruier (Robert Svlor) breaking the monotony. There were 36 lots, going upstairs on ladder through a hole in one corner, a trapdoor in floor for the cella; huge fireplace made of stone and clay, chimney of sticks plastered with mud on inside. floors split out of white ash roofed with peeled basswood bark, candle made from tallow before that cotton flanned put in open dish of lard. Coal came later (kerseane) soap made from wood ashes (liqnel) seth cloth-spin hat (straw) from braided from wheat or oat straw in even which was solden by 1850
