

Mrs. Ida Bennett, 78, Heart Attack Victim

Mrs. Ida (Hallie) Bennett, 78, 232 N. Bostwick Ave., died Monday morning, May 20, 1957, of a heart ailment at her residence after a 10 day illness.

Mrs. Bennett was born in Guelph, Ontario, Canada, on Oct. 12, 1878, the daughter of James and Martha (King) Hall. She married George L. Bennett, a retired furniture manufacturer in Florida in 1921.

NOTED WEEKLY EDITOR AL WEBER DIES AT 86

Al H. Weber, one of the most widely known of Michigan's weekly newspaper editors and publishers, died April 6 at Traverse City Hospital, after an illness which had lasted two years.

Born on an Ohio farm in 1870, he came to Michigan with his parents when a boy of 10. He became a printer's apprentice on the Nashville News at 50 cents a week. He continued with the Nashville weekly eight years. Later he held jobs on newspapers and in printing plants in Chicago, Ann Arbor, Charlotte, Hancock and Hastings, then became manager of the Lake Odessa Wave. He went to Cheboygan, where he bought the weekly Democrat and changed its name to Observer. He sold the Observer two years ago but continued to live in Cheboygan until he passed away.

He was active in public life, was president of Michigan Press Association, president of Eastern Michigan Tourist Association, Mayor of Cheboygan, president of Cheboygan Chamber of Commerce. He is survived by his wife, Fannie, and two nephews, John Weber of Atlanta and Merle Weber of Harrisville, both in newspaper business.

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
