WOODLAND — Mrs. Lulu M. Moxon, 80, wife of the Rev. Frank W. Moxon of Woodland, died at her home Saturday evening at 8:30 o'clock, after a serious illness of several weeks. She was born at Rome City, Ind., Dec. 22, 1877, the daughter of Harlan and Margaret Ann (Miller) Hamilton. They came to the Middleville area when she was four years old. She was married Oct. 21, 1896, to Frank Moxon. The couple farmed in Oceana County before returning to Middleville to live on the farm of his parents. She was converted in 1900 during a revival meeting in the United Brethren Church and Mr. Moxon was converted soon after and began a study for the ministry. They received their first appointment in 1908 at Wakeshma, south of Battle Creek where they stayed two years. Since then they have served at various churches which include Freeport, Charlotte, Hastings, and the Lake Odessa Church at two different times. The last pastorate was from 1939 to 1942. At present the Rev. Moxon is the pastor of the Needmore Church, north of Charlotte. He and his wife had made the trip, a distance of 19 miles, each Sunday as well as on Wednesday night prayer service from their home in Woodland for the past five years. They have also conducted various services and revivals in other churches. Surviving besides the husband, are one daughter, Mrs. Guy (Berneice) Kantner of Woodland; two grandchildren, four great-grandchildren; and one sister, Mrs. Harry Annis of White Cloud.
