

Rev. M. H. Dawson Taken by Death

Funeral services will be held for Reverend Myron H. Dawson on Friday at 2 p.m. from the Calvary United Brethren church at Lake Odessa.

Rev. Dawson died of a heart attack Monday afternoon while shearing sheep at the Ivan Zuchnitt farm on Bell road south of Pleasant Valley.

Rev. Dawson lived on Hunter road, south of Sunfield, since his retirement last August. He was 66 years of age.

The Rev. Don H. Carrick of Sunfield will be officiating pastor. Interment will be made in Sunfield cemetery. The body will be at Mapes Funeral home in Sunfield until Friday noon.

Rev. Dawson was born Noy, 5, 1891 at Elmdale. A minister of the United Brethren Church in Christ since 1914, Rev. Dawson served churches at Woodbury, Climax, Allegan, Lake Odessa, Lansing, Sunfield, Kalamazoo, Fowlerville, Hastings and Freeport.

His last pastorate was at Freeport. For a number of years he was secretary of the United Brethren conference.

Survivors include the widow, Maida; a daughter, Mrs. Lorna Dunham of Lansing; one granddaughter; his father, H. H. Dawson of Lowell; two sisters, Mrs. Iva McIntyre and Mrs. Sabie Baker, both of Lowell; four brothers, Lester of Clarksville, Seymour and Charles of Lowell, and Rev. Lloyd W. of Lansing.
