L. D. Kelsey Dies at 59

Vermontville Doctor Had Been Active in Civic, Lodge Affairs

VERMONTVILLE, Sept. 30 —
Dr. Lewis Donald Kelsey, 59,
died at his home here at 2:30
a. m. Tuesday following a long
illness.

He was a native of Lansing
and came here as an osteopath
25 years ago. He was also a com-
munity leader and was a mem-
ber of the Lions club, Masons,
Eastern Star, American Legion
Post No. 22, Chamber of Com-
merce, village president for nine
years and was a staff member
at McLaughlin Osteopathic hospi-
tal in Lansing.

Surviving are his widow, Hil-
dred; two daughters, Nancy Jo,
Becky Jean, and a son Douglas,
all at home; one sister, Mrs.
Olive C. Colcord of Niles and
one brother, Merwon Kelsey of
Newton, Ill. Funeral services will
be held Thursday at 2 p. m. at
the Vermontville Methodist
church with Rev. Howard Lind-

'Rugged Cross' Composer Dies at Reed City at 85

REED CITY, Oct. 10 (AP)—Rev. George Bennard, 85, composer of the gospel hymn, "The Old Rugged Cross," died today at Reed City hospital after a brief illness. He was a retired minister of the Michigan Methodist conference.

Rev. Bennard was born in Youngstown, O., the son of a coal miner. He worked in Iowa coal mines as a youth of 15 to help support his widowed mother and her six children.

He was drawn to Salvation Army meetings at Canton, Iowa, in 1895 and three years later was commissioned an adjutant, traveling the mid-west to conduct revival meetings.

In 1910, he resigned to devote several years almost exclusively to writing sacred songs.

"The Old Rugged Cross" was written in 1912 while Rev. Bennard was conducting a revival at Albion.

He has written more than 300 sacred songs, the most recent in

1956 entitled "The Light on the Cross."

It commemorates a huge wooden cross erected by the Reed City Chamber of Commerce before his home along US-131 six miles north of the city.

Rev. Bennard is survived by his widow, Hannah, and a son, John Paul Bennard, of Redonda Beach, Cal. Funeral arrangements are pending.

Boy of 5 Lucky; Not Badly Hurt

EATON RAPIDS, Oct. 10 — Alan Smith, 5, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Smith, R. 3, Eaton Rapids, was a lucky boy Thursday.
